AFRICA MEMBERSHIP AND TOTAL PHYSIOTHERAPY WORKFORCE














AFRICA EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE



IMPACT OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC





of countries/territories have full direct access. This is the highest rate of all five regions.




30% reported direct access is only allowed for **private physiotherapy** services.

AFRICA CASE STUDY



NIGERIA – DIRECT ACCESS

The Nigeria Society of Physiotherapy (NSP) continues to advocate for direct access across all tiers of health service delivery. Direct access has been permitted in the private and public sectors since 2020 due to the ongoing work of the NSP, in collaboration with the medical rehabilitation therapists board of Nigeria (MRTBN), the regulatory body in Nigeria. Their advocacy work has included:

- work towards upgrading the physiotherapy entry level curriculum from a bachelor of physiotherapy to a doctor of physiotherapy
- establishing a national physiotherapy postgraduate college two sets of students have already graduated from this programme
- providing continued professional development training for NSP members to improve their skills in direct access clinical services
- engaging with the Nigeria Medical Association and other relevant government agencies to advocate for the role and importance of physiotherapy direct access healthcare services
- proposing a parliamentary physiotherapy act to provide direct access to physiotherapist services at all levels of healthcare
- reviewing and developing a national rehabilitation policy and strategic implementation plan to clearly define how people will access physiotherapy and rehabilitation services via direct access.
